

## **About Us**

The Office of Out of School Time Grants and Youth Outcomes (OST Office) supports equitable access to high-quality, out-of-school-time programs for District of Columbia youth<sup>1</sup>, through coordination across government agencies, targeted grant-making, data collection and evaluation, and the provision of training, capacity building, and technical assistance to out-of-school-time program providers.

The Institute for Youth Development (The Institute) is the training and capacity building arm within the OST Office. The Institute supports program quality and the development of OST staff and program providers. The Institute provides various professional development opportunities, program quality improvement assessments, and technical assistance to OST programs across the District. The OST programs supported through The Institute are committed to improvement in order to connect youth with quality, enriching, and educational experiences beyond school hours.

Learn24 is the OST Office's network of before school, after school, and summer programs, also called out-of-school-time (OST) programs, which was launched by Mayor Bowser in 2017. The OST Office stewards the Learn24 brand to foster awareness of the OST Office and its offerings, The Institute for Youth Development, the Commission on Out of School Time Grants and Youth Outcomes (OST Commission), higher education partners, District agencies, philanthropic partners, and the hundreds of nonprofits and schools that offer programs to youth beyond the school day.

## **Evidence-Based Framework**

A decade of research indicates that youth who regularly participate in quality OST programs benefit in terms of their positive youth development, academic performance, social and emotional development, and health and wellness. In addition, youth participation in OST programs can result in improved school attendance, higher graduation rates, lower high school non-completion rates, stronger academic performance, and improved positive behaviors and work habits.

The OST Commission and the OST Office support access to, and cultivation of, high-quality OST programs through:

- Training and Capacity Building Building the skills for adults who work with youth in OST programs through workshops and conferences organized by The Institute for Youth Development, which is housed within the OST Office.
- Quality Assurance Working directly with OST program leaders and staff through observation, assessment, site visits, administrative checks, and coaching, to improve program design and implementation.
- **Grant-Making/Funding** Providing access to out-of-school time funding.

## About the OST Commission

The OST Commission is a public body composed of engaged residents and representatives from government agencies across the District of Columbia. The mission of the OST Commission is to support equitable access to high-quality OST programs for District of Columbia youth through coordination across government agencies, targeted grant-making, data collection and evaluation, and the provision of training, capacity building, and technical assistance to OST program providers. The OST Commission supports the OST Office through advising and guidance on available resources and supports to ensure a citywide system of high-quality OST programs.

## **Approved OST Office Strategic Plan 2023-2026**

The 2023-2026 Strategic Plan was unanimously approved by the OST Commission during the October 26, 2023 meeting and can be found <a href="here">here</a>. The six strategic priorities for the OST Office over the course of the next three fiscal years include:

Strategy 1	Implement the Vision of Afterschool for All: Provide and expand access to quality, in-demand afterschool programming through continued grantmaking, the launch of 'My Afterschool DC,' and through improving families' access and experiences with OST programs.
Strategy 2	Expand Summer OST Programming: Expand access to quality, in-demand summer OST programming, and improving OST families' access and experiences with summer programs.
Strategy 3	Improve Access for Students with Special Needs: Ensure students with special needs have access to and can participate in out of school time programming.
Strategy 4	Implement Continued Commitment to Quality and Capacity Building: Across all opportunities and efforts, prioritize the continued commitment to high quality and strong OST programming and experiences, and the capacity building of OST program providers.
Strategy 5	Improve OST Systems and Processes: Improve provider experiences through centralized and refined systems and processes.
Strategy 6	Strengthen the OST Office: Strengthen and build the capacity of the team to deliver on the OST vision in support of the Afterschool for All vision through continuous growth and improvement.

The work of the OST Office will remain anchored in the values of **youth voice**, **equity**, **commitment to learning**, **and mutual respect and responsibilities**. The OST Commission and OST Office will be working collaboratively to ensure the six strategic priorities and action items will be implemented with fidelity, and to ensure accountability. The new three-year strategic plan for 2023-2026, which will also be supported by the following OST Commission Committees:

## **Funding and Capacity Building**

The OST Commission prioritizes closing the gap in OST program capacity; this is achieved when all Washington, DC youth have equitable access to diverse, high-quality programs in locations convenient to them. The OST Commission will support Learn24 in closing the gap in OST program

capacity by guiding the OST Office in its mission to provide financial, technical, and educational resources to a wide range of OST providers, large and small, who have established trust with their communities and have experience meeting the needs of their communities.

### Quality

High-quality programs engage youth in the authentic expression of voice and choice by providing safe and supportive environments, caring adults, and structured activities. The OST Commission prioritizes ensuring that all Washington, DC youth have equitable access to high-quality OST programs. The OST Commission provides guidelines for the OST Office on how to measure, assess, and increase program quality.

#### **Outcomes**

Outcomes are the strides the OST Commission expects youth will make through participation in OST programs. Outcomes must evolve with young people as they grow physically, socially, emotionally, and cognitively. The OST Commission prioritizes supporting Learn24 in ensuring that all Washington, DC youth have access to programs that allow them to achieve outcomes. The OST Commission will guide the OST Office on how to define, measure, and assess outcomes.

## **Coordination and Collaboration**

To build a strong and sustainable system that supports high-quality OST programs, the OST Office will rely on the help and input of youth, families, OST providers, experts, and government agencies. To achieve this goal, the OST Commission will encourage connection among various stakeholders, including: the OST Office, government agencies, nonprofit entities, parents, and youth.

## Key Findings from the OST Needs Assessment

During Fiscal Year 2023, the OST Office partnered with the DC Policy Center to implement the OST District-wide Needs assessment of out-of-school time programs in the District of Columbia. The report was commissioned by the OST Office to examine the extent to which OST programs were offered and if the programs were meeting the needs of youth attending Washington, DC public and charter schools. The Assessment was finalized and published by the DC Policy Center on April 18, 2023, and the key findings are captured below:

OST programs were primarily offered by the Department of Parks and Recreation, followed by community-based organizations, then public charter schools and non-Title I District of Columbia Public Schools (DCPS), followed by DCPS Title I schools. A breakdown of the providers and programs can be found below:

More OST seats were available during school year 2021-22 for PK3 through 8 when compared to Grades 9-12, with most of the OST program seats being available afterschool for PK3 through 8, and most seats during the summer for Grades 9-12. A breakdown of OST program seats by program time can be found below:

## Gaps in number of seats:

Four metrics of need for OST programs were defined by the DC Policy Center, based on different policy goals. These metrics included:

- Universal coverage
- Broad income targeting 300% of the federal poverty line
- Students with at-risk status
- Narrow income targeting 100% of the federal poverty line

For afterschool programs, the District of Columbia faced seat shortfalls in each metric except for narrow income targeting PK3 through grade 8 and at the high school level. For the summer there were seat shortfalls across the board for PK3 through 8 and for Universal coverage for grades 9-12.

## Challenges reported by OST providers:

Surveys were administered by the DC Policy Center to gather information from community-based organizations (CBOs), charter schools, and non-Title I schools. The questions related to capacity and program characteristics. Responses were received from 180 providers, including 102 CBOs and 78 schools, with most providers operating in a single Ward, and who offered programs 5 or more times a week, with programs lasting 2-4 hours a day.

## The challenges shared by OST providers included:

- Variable student enrollment and attendance
- Increased levels of absenteeism
- Staff hiring and retention
- Rising costs
- Funding acquisition
- Timing of grant distributions
- Difficulty finding space for programs
- Increased needs of participants, e.g.- direct service provision, mental health supports

## Challenges reported by OST parents and guardians:

Surveys were distributed from the DC Policy Center to parents and guardians, in partnership with Parents Amplifying Voices in Education (PAVE). Surveys were administered in English and in Spanish. Questions were related to participation in OST programs, expectations from OST programs, and challenges experienced in accessing OST programs. The most common challenges respondents shared included:

- Transportation
- Distance
- Finding program information (e.g.- information on when sign-ups would occur, how to sign-up, what services programs offered, and how much programs costs)

## Challenges were increased for families:

- With no internet access or devices
- With language barriers
- Who are essential workers (cannot be online at certain times during the day)
- Who are caring for children with special needs

## Fiscal Year 2023 Grant Funds

The OST Office received \$16,998,804 in local funds to be used as grants to nonprofits that offer OST programs. ESSER funds were also received for afterschool and summer programming, to provide additional out-of-school time programming, with those funds housed within the Office of the State Superintendent of Education (OSSE). Because those funds fell within the funding stream of OSSE, they were not included here.

## **OST Office Fiscal Year 2023 Grant Administration**

The OST Office continued serving as the largest out-of-school time grant-making entity for Fiscal Year 2023 (FY23) in the District of Columbia. The OST Office released the various direct services grant competitions, collected and monitored submissions, helped to recruit, train, and support grant reviewers, and worked directly with the grantees on grant agreements, financial reports, grant compliance, and invoicing. Grant payments were made through the DC Vendor Portal.
