

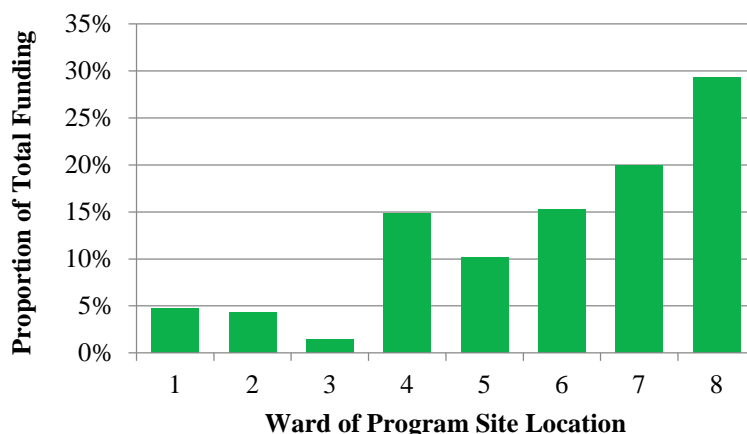
## School Year 2018-2019 Out-of-School Time Grant Competitions Summary

The Office of Out of School Time Grants and Youth Outcomes (OST Office), located in the Office of the Deputy Mayor for Education (DME), and United Way of the National Capital Area (United Way NCA) are pleased to announce Out of School Time awardees for the upcoming school year. In total, 67 organizations applied for either the School Year 2018-2019 Out of School Time (SY18-19 OST) grant competition or the School Year 2018-2019 Community Based (SY18-19 CB) grant competition. An additional 39 organizations applied for continuation awards. The number of strong programs and organizations that applied was impressive and we value the work each provider does to support youth across the District of Columbia.

### Highlights

- In total, \$6.2 million will be awarded to 80 non-profit organizations that will provide services to over 10,000 District of Columbia children and youth during the upcoming school year.
- Of the total:
  - \$3,648,880 will be awarded to 39 organizations receiving continuation grants. These organizations will continue to serve approximately 7,971 District youth in SY 2018-19.
  - \$2,136,131 will be awarded to 24 organizations receiving SY18-19 OST grants. These organizations will serve approximately 2,096 District youth in SY 2018-19.
  - \$405,880 will be awarded to 17 organizations receiving SY18-19 CB grants and will serve approximately 605 District youth
- 30 organizations are new grantees that have not been previously funded by the OST Office
- The funding will support programs at sites across wards, but particularly program sites located in Wards 7 and 8.

### Overview of Grant Competitions

#### 1) SY18-19 OST Grant Competition

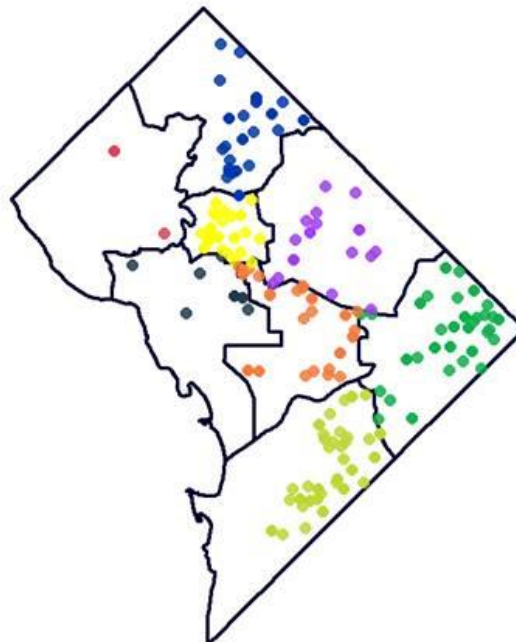
- The SY18-19 OST grant was open to all non-profit OST providers and applicants could request up to \$100,000.
- 56 applications were received for a total request of \$4.98 million.
- All applications were read and scored by a minimum of three impartial reviewers using rubrics that were made available to all applicants.

- Priority Points were given to applicants with program sites in Wards with high need for more free and low-cost OST opportunities. The maximum number of priority points awarded was 14.
  - Any application that had a final score of 99 or greater was fully funded.
- 2) SY18-19 CB Grant Competition
- New this year, the SY18-19 CB grant competition focused on funding community-based non-profits with operating budgets less than \$250,000. Applicants could request up to \$25,000.
  - Of the 13 applications received, 11 were eligible for review.
  - The 11 applicants requested a total of \$255,880.
  - Applications were reviewed by a panel of reviewers who reached a consensus score.
  - The 11 eligible applicants were all fully funded. An additional 6 organizations that unsuccessfully applied for the SY18-19 OST grant but were eligible for the SY18-19 CB grant were also funded.
- 3) SY18-19 Continuation Awards
- In SY 2017-2018, 41 OST grantees were awarded. Of those, 39 remained eligible and in good standing. All 39 were awarded continuation grants of up to \$100,000.
